Swing, swing indeed

Pianist Roy Gerson couldn't have picked a more appropriate name for his band. The Swinget says it all, no matter how many musicians he has along for the fun ride on a given night.

He brought his full eight-member band to Port Charlotte on Monday, February 10 for a Charlotte County Jazz Society concert. The band dug into a strong blend of material from the Great American Songbook, vintage swing jazz, a bit of boogie woogie, the blues, the heartache lyrics of Billie Holiday and even some R&B.

The band included trumpeters Dan Miller and Randy Sandke, trombonist Herb Bruce, guitarist Frank Portolese, bassist Don Mopsick, drummer Tony Vigilante

and singer Corrine Manning. Gerson and Manning moved to Naples three years ago from New York City.

With Gerson drawing on his savvy skills as a bandleader, this was a night for sprightly horn solos and varied instrumental combinations. It enabled him to spotlight every member of the band at least a couple of times. For example, Manning and Miller teamed beautifully on a "September in the Rain," and trombonist Bruce was featured on "Stars Fell on Alabama" and "Stardust."

When one horn player took a solo, the other two often would team up to comp behind him on the many ensemble pieces. Philadelphia native Vigilante, who was Ben Vereen's touring drummer for 20 years, provided a powerful, swinging beat all night long. He was featured on "Caravan," "Cottontail" and the concert closer, Lionel Hampton's uptempo classic "Flying Home."

Manning's soulful vocals were particularly poignant on Holiday's "Don't Explain" and "I Don't Hurt Anymore," the 1954 country hit by Hank Snow that was covered later that year by Dinah Washington. She changed the pace with French lyrics to Sidney Bechet's classic "Si Tu Vois Ma Mere" (If You See My Mother) that was featured in Woody Allen's 2011 film "Midnight in Paris."

Portolese shifted with ease between rhythm guitar and melodic solos. He was featured on "Stompin' at the Savoy" and a bluesy and swinging instrumental take of the Ray Charles hit "One Mint Julep." Sandke offered a poignant take on "I've Got a Right to Sing the Blues" and

teamed with Manning on "A Kiss to Build a Dream On." Miller soared on "Sometimes I'm Happy." Mopsick's creative versatility as a bass soloist was spotlighted on "The Man I Love." Gerson, who was house pianist at The Village Gate in the 1990s, is a stride and boogie-woogie piano master. This night, he showcased his playing prowess only twice. Those were his boogie-woogie take on "Honky Tonk" with just the rhythm section, and his Second Set take on "Brother, Can You Spare a Dime?" The latter, a Great Depression-era tune from the 1932 musical "Americana," is based on a Russian -Jewish lullaby melody. In Gerson's hands, it sounded like something out of "Fiddler on the Roof."

Figueiredo delights in two musical contexts

Brazilian guitarist Diego Figueiredo brought his acoustic guitar and deep musical savvy to Port Charlotte FL on Monday, March 9 in his first visit to the Charlotte County Jazz Society stage. He delivered mightily in two different contexts: a solo guitar set and a closing set in a swinging trio.

Figueiredo, 39, blended Brazilian, Latin and standard fare with ease throughout the night. There were several sambas, a few of Antonio Carlos Jobim's classic bossa novas and even the most famous Brazilian waltz, Dilermande Reis' "If She Asks."



Everything he chose to play was imbued with eyepopping technique delivered with his finger-pick style that combines melody, and bass lines, and percussive accents from his left hand sliding down the fret board. His right hand is something else, with his extra-long fingernails being the picks.

On this night, Figueiredo worked without any set list or preplanning. He walked on stage, sat down and played whatever inspired him at the moment. The night's lone original, though he has many to his credit, was a tune called "Soul" that showcased his style.


After a Spanish-tinged take on Cuban composer Osvaldo Farrés' "Perhaps, Perhaps, Perhaps," a hit back in the day for both Nat King Cole and Doris Day, he offered a five-part medley of jazz standards. "The Lady is a Tramp," "Tea for Two," and "Stella by Starlight" led into Pat Metheny's instrumental classic






"James." Glenn Miller's orchestra theme "Moonlight Serenade" closed it out. Figueiredo finished the set with a fiery take on Cuban composer Ernesto Lecuona's flamenco homage "Malagueña."

The second set was the intense groove portion of the evening, with Marty Morell (pianist Bill Evans' longest-tenured drummer) and Cuban-born bassist Mauricio Ro-



They closed out the evening with three very different tunes: Jobim's "Desafinado," Paul McCartney's Beatles' hit "Yesterday," and a Duke Ellington repertoire classic, Juan Tizol's "Caravan," which is always a crowd pleaser.

Get ready for an afternoon of Jazz Samba

A CCJS matinee at The Grill at 1951

Join CCJS on Wednesday, May 13 at The Grill at 1951 for a special, intimate matinee performance celebrating the intersection of jazz and Brazilian music, a hybrid that took the world by storm in the early 1960s.

Acoustic guitarist Nate Najar and Brazilian singer Daniela Soledade will dig into the intimate, quiet, beautiful moments in bossa nova. These Tampa Bay-area musicians have interesting legacies that meet at that musical cross pollination.

Soledade's debut recording, the Najar-produced *A Moment of You* (Blue Line Music, 2019), features a range of bossa nova gems, some original songs and Brazilian versions of jazz standards. The singer's late grandfather, Paulo Soledade, was a composer and collaborator with Brazilian music legends Antonio Carlos Jobim, Vinícius de Moraes and Baden Powell. Her father, Paulinho Soledade, a singer, guitarist and composer, worked as a producer and partner with Ivan Lins and Gilberto Gil. The young Daniela spent time in top studios in Rio de Janeiro, observing and performing with her father. She studied flute at the Music Conservatory Villa Lobos in Rio at age 14, and continued immersing herself in music after moving to Florida at 16.

Najar is a virtuoso guitarist who has led his own bands and toured with Acoustic Alchemy. He is a disciple of the late Charlie Byrd, the finger-style guitarist who first brought the sound of Brazilian jazz to the United States with his early 1960s recordings with tenor saxophonist Stan Getz. While Najar's imaginative playing is steeped in Byrd's tradition, he has also absorbed pother musical influences, including classical, bebop and fusion. His own recordings include 2012's *The Nate Najar Trio Remembers Charlie Byrd* (2012), *Aquarela Do Brasil* (2014), *This is Nate Najar* (2016) and *Under Paris Skies* (2018), which explored his love of French jazz and pop.

This limited-seating concert at The Grill at 1951, a CCJS community partner, is from 2 to 4 p.m. Food and beverages will be available from 12:30 to 3 p.m. Sign up early to ensure you have a seat at this 100-seat venue at 1951 Tamiami Trail, Port Charlotte.

Tickets are \$10 each, obtained by writing a check to CCJS and mailing it to Connie Gean, 447 Blossom St., Port Charlotte FL 33952. Your tickets will be waiting at the door, starting at 12:30 p.m. on the day of the performance.
