## An Entertaining Start to the New Year

Welcoming our New Year in CCJS style, Danny Bacher brought his six-man ensemble to take us down a history laden road. "At the Jazz Band Ball" appropriately led off the show. This was the first jazz tune ever recorded in 1917 by The Original Dixieland Jazz Band. The night's journey included "Is You Is or Is You Ain't My Baby," "Minnie the Moocher," and "St. James Infirmary." He was backed by his rhythm section with Simon Lasky on piano, Alejandro Arenas on bass, and Rick Costa on drums. James Suggs on trumpet and Herb Bruce on trombone joined him on the front line.

Danny is one of those gifted guys that not only is an accomplished musician but an outstanding entertainer as well.

He played his soprano sax, sang, and danced away the evening. He brought us through some movie soundtrack favorites like "I Wanna Be Like You" and "Frasier the Sensuous Lion." ### **Explosive entertainment by Michael Andrew and The Atomic Big Band**

The CCJS February concert bought us the big band sounds of Michael Andrew and The Atomic Big Band. The concert started off with "Come Fly" performed by The Atomic Big Band, which included Alex Kastner, Ryan Chapman, John DePaola, and David Pruyn on trumpet, Herb Bruce, Chris Clifton, Greg Nielsen, and Chris Lundquist on trombone, Dave MacKenzie, Pete Barenbregge, Lew DelGatto, Valerie Gillespie and Mike Brignola on saxophone, Frank Portolese on guitar, Charlie Silva on bass and Paul Parker on drums.

Michael Andrew came out on stage with an explosive start with "World on a String." He quickly followed with "Lady's A Tramp" and a toe-tapping medley of Bobby Darin favorites, including "Beyond the Sea," "Splish Splash" and "Mac the Knife." This rock and roll interlude was quickly followed up by a couple of Dean Martin favorites, "Ain't That a Kick in the Head" and "Everybody Loves Somebody."

The very personable Michael Andrew asked for audience requests and delighted us with "Anything Goes" and "Unforgettable." The evening concert closed with the classic "New York, New York" and "My Way."


