Notes from the President's Desk



What Is Jazz?

We are now approaching the midpoint of our season. Three of our seven concerts are down, four to go. All of these were firstclass performances but representing very different styles. So, what is jazz? We have seen its diversity in these three groups but what is its commonality? Webster defines Jazz as an "American music developed especially from ragtime and blues and characterized by propulsive syncopated rhythms, polyphonic ensemble playing, varying degrees of improvisation, and often deliberate distortions of pitch and timbre".

This all roughly began around the turn of the twentieth century in America's deep south centered around New Orleans. During the early part of the century that music evolved and traveled up the Mississippi River to Chicago. The classic Dixieland sound morphing into early swing and ultimately the big band swing era.

By the 30's this American idiom had spread worldwide. During WW2 big bands began to fade secondary to lack of musicians and the Bebop era was born with the likes of Earl Hines, Charlie Parker and Dizzy Gillespie. Styles such as hard Bop in the east and the Cool on the west coast followed with Miles Davis in the lead. As Rock became the predominant popular music of the day, jazz quietly moved into progressive, modern or contemporary directions with much less popular influence. We are the Charlotte County Jazz Society. We don't have the option to mix styles in a single concert as the classical symphony orchestra can. Our groups are committed to their chosen genres. So, we try to mix our concerts to encompass the breadth of Jazz. We select representative groups from early traditional, Swing, Big Band, Bebop/Cool and modern/contemporary/progressive styles. Our requirement for these performers is that they represent the best musicians available in their genre. Just as our chosen art form is very diverse our audience has very diverse tastes as well. I certainly have my favorites within any season. I hope everyone enjoys the concerts to come. See you next year!
